



Jim's Tech Tip

While My Oil Gently Drains

Save Time by Working Smarter Every time you drain the engine oil to change it, while you are waiting for all the dripping to stop, may I suggest you add the following simple items to your oil change routine?

> Check the ignition point gap with a 0.020" feeler gauge. Adjust if required. Look at the points to make sure they still look good (not pitted or burnt).

> Wipe off the ignition cam with a rag. Now put a small dab of fresh cam grease on 2 of the lobes of the ignition cam.

> Put a drop or two of light oil in the little oiler on the side of the distributor. If you have the cam screw with the hole drilled in it, put a drop or two in there, too.

> Put a couple of drops of engine oil in each hole on top of the throttle assembly that is bolted to the back of the engine.

Check the fan belt for tension.

That's it! In the time it takes for the oil to all drain out, you have taken care of several little routine maintenance items on you're "A" that will help keep it running well and avoid a problem on the road.

Have a Model A Day!

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Technical Tip – Tires

A lot of guys try to keep their best tires on the front of their Model A and modern cars.

Put your best tires on the rear of the car.

Kurt Scientific Counselors, Inc., examines many accidents involving tires each year. More rear tire blowouts become accidents. A tire failure on the rear of the vehicle is more apt to result in loss of steering control than a tire failure on the front. When a rear tire fails, the rear of the vehicle swerves or fishtails in the direction of the failed tire. This points the vehicle in the opposite direction, and in nine out of ten rear tire failure accidents, the vehicle ends up on the side of the highway opposite the side of the failed tire. When a front tire fails, the vehicle also veers in the direction of the failed tire, but a competent driver can maintain steering control until the vehicle comes to a stop. Goodyear's tire experts also warn that bringing a car under control after a rear tire is punctured often can be more difficult than if the puncture had occurred in the front tire. The other interesting fact of this era scan is the designers name at the bottom. I like to find out who they are, so I've included a bit of history too.

Designer Jean Patou



Jean Patou (pronounced pa tu) is a designer name you see often on the pages of Model A era magazines. He was born in 1880 in Normandy, France. Patou's family's business was tanning and furs. Patou worked with his uncle in Normandy, then moved to Paris in 1910, intent on becoming a couturier. In 1912, he opened a small dressmaking salon called "Maison Parry". He was mobilized during World War I, reopening his couture house in 1919. He became known for eradicating the "flapper" look by lengthening the skirts and designing sportswear for women and is considered the inventor of the knitted swimwear and the tennis skirt. He also was the first designer to popularize



the cardigan and moved fashion towards the natural and comfortable. In 1925 Patou launched his perfume business, in 1928 he created "Huile de Chaldee", the first sun tan lotion. When the stock market crashed, so did the luxury fashion market. He survived through his perfumes. Patou died prematurely in 1936. His sister and her husband continued the House of Patou. Several other designers continued the House of Patou until 1987. I share this information gathered from Wikipedia, you can read more on the internet.

Lyn McDonald gave the invocation for the banquet...


He also announced that Tom Irwin was the winner of the Photo Contest, receiving \$100. You'll see his award winning photo on the newsletter cover later this year.




Someone at each table was the winner of the centerpiece which was a Coke glass pilled with carnations, sitting on an old record. Very creative!

WINDOW REGULATOR SPRING TOOL

Sometimes a window regulator spring will either break or become so weak that it makes it hard to roll up the window. Installing a new spring can be difficult and also dangerous.

Take an old distributor shaft and weld on a T handle made from rod stock. Grind down the slotted end so the slot is only 1/4" deep. Put the regulator in a vise and wind it until the lift arm is all the way up. This is the position in which the spring is least compressed. Hook the outer





hook of the spring and insert the tool in the center. Turn the tool to compress the spring until it fits into the slot. Release the tool. Tap the spring into position with a hammer.
