


David Adair presented part 1 of a seminar on Model A Horn Maintenance at the February meeting. It will be continued with part 2 at the March meeting.





History of My Coupe ∼ Ray Horton

I had been enamored of the Business Coupe (54A) for a long time, probably since I first saw one owned by a neighbor lady in 1962. Hers was a '28. As I got further into Model A's, I learned that the 1929 Business Coupe had an oval quarter window. I really liked that feature, and the search began. I wanted that Business Coupe with the oval window.



But it wasn't until 2006 that the search got serious. I watched auctions, eBay, MAFCA classifieds, and every other source I could imagine, willing even to travel across the country for the right car at the right price.

Well, there were only 37,644 oval window couples made, and only in 1929. Because of the fabric top material, many had deteriorated rotted tops which leaked, and the lower bodies had consequently rusted away. They weren't actually "rare", but it was very hard to find one in any reasonable condition at a reasonable price, anywhere. Until 2011.

One day in August 2011, looking at the Portland Craigs List, >OH MY STARS!< There's a 1929 Business Coupe for sale in Beaverton! 15 miles from home! It looks good and the price is right. I know I'm gonna buy it even before I see it. But I go out, drive it, and make my offer, which is accepted. Yowza! I own a 1929 oval window Model A Business Coupe!

I drive it home, but the clutch fingers are so far out of adjustment it barely shifts. The engine is noisy and needs work. It overheats. Cosmetically it's acceptable, but I know I have mechanical work ahead. (I later learned that Tom Irwin had looked at the car and decide against it).

I have since gone through it mechanically, including an engine rebuild (that's a story in itself), brakes, clutch, radiator, electricals, trans, and it is now a really fun and reliable car to drive. It's light and quick and has great acceleration. I reconverted the rumble seat back to a trunk (factory original). I like the style because the sport/business couple top refers to earlier buggy design, and the oval windows are so unusual and elegant! (Ford didn't use an opera window again until the 1956 Thunderbird hardtop). I have now had the car for seven years, and it is my favorite car.

TINY TIP - Door Handle Installation by Joe Tennyson, Chestertown, N.Y.

Before installing the exterior door handles on that freshly painted door, place several layers of masking tape around the hole that the handle mounts through. Sometimes considerable amounts of pressure are required before the handle will slip into position. This may cause the escutcheon to slam against the door, marring that beautiful new paint job. Several layers of masking tape are required because the edges of the escutcheon are very sharp. The tape is easily removed after the handle is in place. (Borrowed from The Desert A newsletter)



Jim's Tech Tip - Don't forget the Spare!

When checking tire pressures and bringing them back up to 35psi, don't forget to check the spare tire(s). I had a puncher last Monday and my spare only had about 20 psi in it. Luckily someone in the group had a small portable compressor with them and we were able to air it up and go.

THE FIRST GET TOGETHER OF BEAVER CHAPTER MODEL A FANATICS!

At the last board meeting he showed us an album from Beaver Chapters humble beginning. The following is minutes from their first recorded meeting. BULLETIN February 1, 1961

The first get-together of the Model A fanatics was a gabby success and the ground work was well established for an area chapter of the Model A Ford Club of America. A Chapter name was unanimously adopted: "BEAVER".

How often and where meetings should be held was well discussed with majority approval of meeting dates as follows: (1) Third Wednesday of the odd calendar months, i.e. January, March, May. etc.; (2) Third Saturday of the even calendar months, i.e. February, April, June, etc.

Inasmuch as we are still in an embryo stage, it was agreed to continue our meetings at fella' members homes which will accommodate the group. The emphasis on this was to keep the monthly gettogethers as informal as possible.

Next on the agenda was selecting a By-Laws committee – composed of Stan Jones, Martin Bankus and yours truly. This committee was instructed to bring back to the A Bone devotees a proposed set of By-Laws to be adopted at the next meeting.

Ken Kinnear volunteered for the important and busy job of Activities Chairman. This can only be successful providing the rest of us give him a big assist by passing along any ideas we may have.

In regard to Charter Members of the Beaver Chapter it was unanimously adopted that any 'A' enthusiast who joins our group by the third meeting, March 15, 1961, will be considered a charter member.

Fifteen participants were on hand at this meeting and a lot of fun was had in drawing for Chapter Charter Card numbers. The enclosed list of Charter Members indicates the luck, or bad deal, that was drawn.

Andy Haunt volunteered to explore the costs for membership cards to be printed. He will report on this at the next meeting.

As February is an even month, the next meeting will be held on Saturday, February 18th at 2PM at the residence of Jack Lester.

Until our financial structure is agreed upon the numbers present donated a total of \$7.11 to start our treasury. Remember February 18th. Bring other enthusiasts, your A Bone and some little goodie that you are willing to part with. No fees involved.

So what is a "Hubley" you may ask?

The Hubley Company made metal replicas of Model A Fords. Gabriel and Scale Model are other companies that make them. They are die cast 1/24 scale models. There are seven Model A body styles available. You can find them at swap meets, antique stores, eBay, and sometimes sitting on a hobby store shelf. Weight of finished car is no more than 1 pound, 5 ounces (a small leeway is allowed).

Someone got the idea it might be fun to "race" these model card down a track similar to the "Pinewood Derby" that the scouts use. The Hubley Derby is a side by side gravity race. The race is a great participant and spectator event. The fiercest competition is in the 18 and over age group.
