Refreshments were provided by Pam and Terry and Ted Downs provided the water and sodas.


Meeting adjourned at 8:07 pm.

September 1931 Pictorial Review

This offering of fall fashions is each different - and similar! First of all I view these models as all elegantly attired. It just may be that in our modern day times we don't usually see ladies dressed in gloves, hats and heels. This was considered standard daytime wear during the four years the Model A's were manufactured. As you can see, each outfit is different from the other, so lets look at what makes them similar and common for 1931 fashions. First of all, notice that each costume is belted at the waistline. Collars and neck-lines were important and varied. Skirt length was long, several inches below the knee. Pleats and bias cut seams provided flare to the skirts of the garments. Purses shown are clutch styles, though some in 1931 had short handles. Various height of heels and styles were worn depending on how sporty, casual or more dressy the main garment was. Next check out the hats. Each one is much smaller, often off the face, with more of their hair showing. Compare them to the helmet cloche styles and large brims that were worn in 1928 and 1929. Finally, don't forget the gloves. Four of the models have the gauntlet style gloves with the flared longer length. However, there was also shorter gloves still worn. Just as the clothing industry does today, the "vogue" changes and evolves each year. ~ Jeanie Adair




