INTERNATIONAL MODEL A FORD DAY


Bob Moore and his Beagle in his Model A Roadster

ONE MAN'S STORY OF A VEHICLE RESTORATION

In 1972 Jim Rowen bought a farmer's worn out 1929 Model A AA ton and a half stake bed truck for \$250 (that is a Model A on a AA chassis. In truck nerd talk that's: 82-A Budd Mfg. closed cab; 88 Platform (Bed) Midland Mfg.; 188-A stake rack; AA131 and half inch Ford wheelbase chassis. Like all restorations it involves three phases: 1. Vision; 2.Collecting vehicle and parts; 3.Sorting: restoration, fitting, mechanical integration between systems. (Most difficult, most skill, most dollars).

His goal was to "drive a truck like the "Walton's drove." Jim brought to this process a commitment to complete the project, quality/originality and experience of driving, restoring and maintaining a 1929 closed cab pickup acquired in 1962. His Model A club complemented his commitment. As a professional truck driver he always wanted a Model A AA.

The two trucks were similar. Same paint, front fenders, Budd cab, engine, front end and 3sp tranny. Relatively easy for parts and restoration. The challenges were a larger chassis requiring two men to move; the scarcity of truck parts in 1972; rare, low-production parts like fender shrouds, running boards and splash aprons and rear fenders only built for this truck.

His original fenders were not rebuildable. A pair was located in Long Beach CA and happily acquired at the \$900 asking price. The biggest restoration expense was the body man who was experienced in lead restoration. He beautifully recreated the base sill along the cab cowl and lower portions of the doors along with other body work chores. All lead filled.

His restoration commitment was tested in the 1980's when he had to rent a two-car garage just to restore and store the truck, plus waiting months for the body man to work on rusted out door bottoms. He acquired hard white oak for the stake bed and painted the chassis gloss black finding out later the factory color was satin or flat black and discovered he installed incorrect stakes.

The decision was made to tear down the truck a second time to correct errors of the paint, stakes, correct mirrors etc. He showed a real commitment to correctness and originality.

He was asked, Jim, would you do it all over today?"

"NO," boomed his answer., citing the costs, parts scarcity, body work and tradespeople costs, as well as the energy the project took. Another 'down to earth" answer from Jim.

Thank you Jim for your 20 years of "blood, sweat and tears" on this classic.

SCENIC VALLEY FARM AND WINERY TOUR—AUGUST 27th

For those of you that missed the August tour, you missed a great informative talk on the process of a hop harvest. This was the main focus of our tour to Scenic Valley Farm and Winery. Our knowledgeable host for this tour was Bob Zielinski, farmer and owner of several thousand acres of about nine different crops in the Willamette Valley and Central Oregon. This is a family owned and operated working farm. Stuff happens when you are a farmer. Our original plan was to view the actual harvest of the hop crop, with each of the procedures in full swing. Bob found out the night before that the crew would not be working on the Sunday of our visit. He was so apologetic for not being able to show the working process but as it turned out we probably got a better education on the hop process. For starters, when all of the machinery is running it is very noisy so we did not have to break into groups to tour the hop shed. Bob was able to design this processing shed, so he did a few innovative changes to eliminate most of the injury hazards that you would find in other hop sheds and also a unique drying process that would more efficiently dry the hops with limited man power and probably zero waste. We were able to go through the hop drop floor, up the stairs to the cat walk to see where the canes are dropped into a separator where the hop cone is pulled from the vine and the waste eliminated and ground up and put back into other crop fields to enrich the soil. Onto the drying process, down to see the gigantic fans that blow up into the drying box and then the baling of the hops into 100 pound blocks.

We then got back into our cars for about a quarter mile drive to the winery and the beautiful tasting/museum room. Bob was very generous and allowed us all to have a complementary wine tasting along with an appetizer plate. Having had some of his wines in the past, I know they are really tasty. I guess a lot of our members thought so also as many took home bottles of their favorites home with them. With a glass of wine in hand, we headed across the parking lot to tour the winery. This farm does the whole process, growing the grapes, picking the clusters at peak time, doing the crush, making the wine, aging and getting ready for shipping. Some of these wines are shipped to Washington and California but most of the wine goes to the east coast. Of course this year's crop is not ready to be picked yet so not much happening in the wine process but again we got a good education on the process.

Bob is a very busy guy on the farm and in the community so we are very grateful for the time he took out of his hectic schedule to host our club. He is also a member of our Beaver Chapter. He owns a beautiful 1930 Model A Sport Coup and a newly remodeled 1915 Model T. Kirk Metteer has spent the last couple of years on this project with engine help from Tom Irwin and wood help from Stan Symank. He also had a display of some vintage tractors, of special interest to some of our farmer members, and a balcony of vintage family heirlooms.

A MODEL A WORK PARTY

Thursday, August 31st, was a big Model A event within the membership of Beaver Chapter. Last Sunday during the club tour Pam and Terry finalized getting volunteers to help setting the body of her late '31 S/W town Sedan on the chassis. The body is freshly painted, Chicle Drab and Copra Drab, and it looks great.

The recruits showed up at 10 AM ready to work. Three 2 x 4's were place cross wise under the body and in no time at all the six of us had lifted the body, walked it forward and set it onto the chassis. Just as the body was set down, Art Pugsley arrived with three more men from Vancouver. But not to worry, there was plenty left to do.

In no time at all the doors and hinge pins appeared and like magic the doors were hung. With two or three men per door, there were no chips or scratches in the paint. Then radiator support rods were installed and the hood was set onto the chassis. Next we decided the body had to be bolted to the frame. Again there were enough of us to do the job.

Twelve of us working on the car was not too many. The shop was large enough that we were not tripping over each other. And we were all able to pitch in and do a little. Plus there was always a hand to hold a bolt inside the body when these were tightened.

Then it was time for lunch. Pam prepared a lunch with hearty soup, homemade sourdough bread, fresh garden grown tomatoes, beverages, followed by huge vanilla ice cream sundaes with homemade berry topping. M'mm good! Boy oh boy this lunch was a treat.

After lunch Terry decided the remaining work was best done by just one or two so the crew was allowed to leave. But that is not all, there were fringe benefits from getting this many Model A'ers together. David was able to get three men to volunteer to remove the bed from his pickup so that he can make a minor repair to the frame. Tom Ryan was also able to get a volunteer to help drill and tap his flywheel and install a Helicoil. A bolt was stripped when the final torque was applied to the bolt holding the fly wheel to the crankshaft. We will meet with him and help correct this situation. All in all this was a great work party and I'm proud that I was asked to help.
