



DNA of a Model A

His father was a Lincoln, his mother a Model T from father he got hubris, from his mother humility

The Model A was also known as the Baby Lincoln. One of the stories told when the Model A was introduced was that a Model A owner was driving along a stretch of highway approaching a Lincoln from the rear. The Lincoln, feeling challenged, sped up. The Model A pursued and finally caught the Lincoln. As the A pulled even with the Lincoln the Model A driver yelled over, "Can you tell me how to get this thing outta second gear?"

When the highly productive Model T reached menopause and reproduction slowed to almost becoming barren it was time to find a more fertile product. These ensembles feature three quarter length jackets from November 1929.

A three petal jabot forms a smart V neckline on a tailored frock on the left. It's self fabric belt rests just below the natural waistline. Patch pocket and two front kick pleats finish the dress. The jacket is simple in lines with a stand up collar.

The second ensemble is three pieces - a coat and skirt of the same fabric and a separate blouse. The coat sports a fur collar. The skirt has kick pleats. The blouse is the typical V neckline that overlaps toward the side and ends with a dropped waist bow tie.

Notice the back versions on both of the examples that the skirts are straight in the back.

And don't forget to check out the hats! They are all cloche style and show more forehead than in 1928.

Let's keep the hobby going by keeping the Model A's on the road and sharing their history and fun with others.





During tune-ups, do you ever find it awkward to hand crank the engine while holding in the timing pin? Here's an easy and cheap fix.

Loop a common (4" x1/4") heavy rubber band around timing pin threads. Then, stretch it back to a valve cover bold head.

Now you can brace yourself with left hand, turn crank slowly with right hand and watch as the pin drops into the cam gear dimple.

WEEKLY SERVICE LETTER

ENGINE TIMING

In checking complaints of poor gas mileage, or lack of speed in the Model A Car, we have found in practically every instance, these complaints are due to improper timing and incorrect spacing of the distributor points or spark plug gaps. We have also found in questioning dealers' shop foremen, superintendents and mechanics, a general lack of knowledge as to the correct clearances for these settings. We, therefore, direct your attention to Page 542 of the February Service Bulleting, showing the distributor points as correctly set .018 to .022 and spark plug point gaps properly set of .035. It will be very much to your advantage to question your own shop men to determine whether or not they are familiar with this clearance and to further ascertain whether or not they know how to properly time a motor. It is very important in timing a motor that the distributor body be installed and that the rotor arm is opposite number one contact in the distributor body as outlined on Page 480 of the August 1930 Service Bulletin, and also on Page 346 of the May 1929 Service Bulletin. These instructions should be reviewed from time to time, as this will assist considerably in the rendering of good service.
