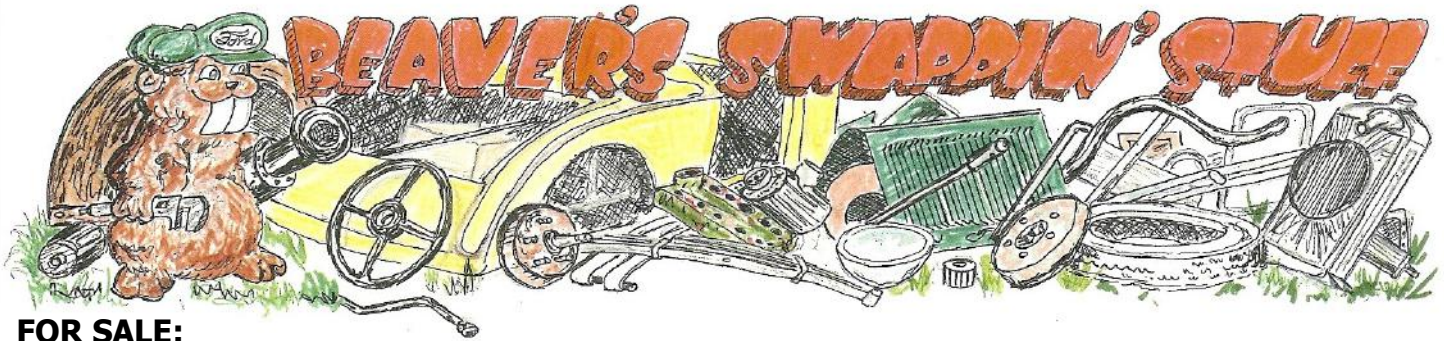

Like many people in the old car hobby, I enjoy rummaging around the back shelves of junk stores, visiting old car dealerships, exploring small towns left behind by time, and burrowing through garages at estate sales. About eight years ago I was driving through the Alvord Desert region (that's another story) when I was attracted by a small handwritten sign on a back road between Fields and Harper which read, "Ranch barn sale 3 miles", with an arrow pointing the way.

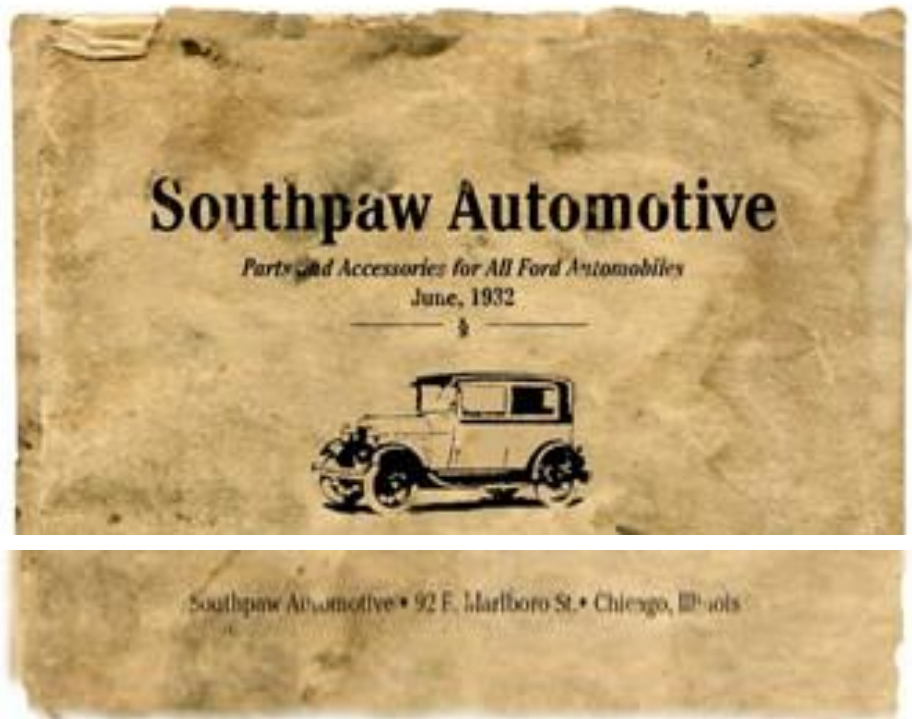
But once the door opened, it was quickly apparent this sale had been going on for some time. There was almost nothing left, if there had ever been anything in the first place. A few rusted items on a table, a broken lamp, and a... wait a minute. A dirty book! No, not that kind. This was a well used catalog with the title:

Parts and Accessories for All Ford
Automobiles
June, 1932
Then at the bottom an address in
Chicago, Illinois

Whoa Nellie! I carefully thumbed through it as nonchalantly as I could, and noted illustrations of lights, horns, heaters, fenders, gaskets, and some stuff I've never seen before, along with item lists and prices. All items seemed to be for Model T and Model A. "How much?" I sez. "A dollar," he sez. I don't haggle.

There being nothing else to see, I made my excuses and bid adieu to the old gentleman. As soon as I'm out of sight of the farmhouse, I pull over to more closely examine my new prize. Oh my stars. Head gasket - 25¢. Replacement headlight lens - 75¢. Original Heinze wiper motor - \$3.00. Accessory wiper arm mechanism to add a passenger side wiper -\$1.00. "Cigar lighter for your new Ford" - \$1.00. Radio (RADIO!) \$32.00. Clock - \$9.50. Wouldn't it be great to find these things now at those prices!

I flip to the back of the book, and there's still a "How to Order" page. *"Send check or money order. No stamps please. Allow 4 weeks for delivery."* (continues on next page)

I'm thinking, what would happen if I sent in an order, for, say, a pair of fender lamps, \$5.00? Or a Sport Light! Only \$10.00 in the catalog. Oh-oh. Here's an Owen-Dyneto wiper motor, "For 1928 Tudors and Coupes". \$4.00. What if I sent \$4.00 to Southpaw at their 1932 Chicago address, with an order for a new wiper motor? I chuckle to myself. But my brain gets fevered. I can't stop thinking about this, all the way home. I almost forget to get gas. By the time I get back into John Day my gauge is reading EMPTY or less.

It's nearly midnight when I finally pull into my garage, but I am completely obsessed with the idea of ordering the wiper motor. My wife wakes up long enough to say hello, and I retreat to my little study, copy the order form out of the catalog (I'm not going to cut this out!), write a check for \$5.50 (\$4.00 for the wiper plus \$1.50 shipping and handling), and seal it all in an envelope.

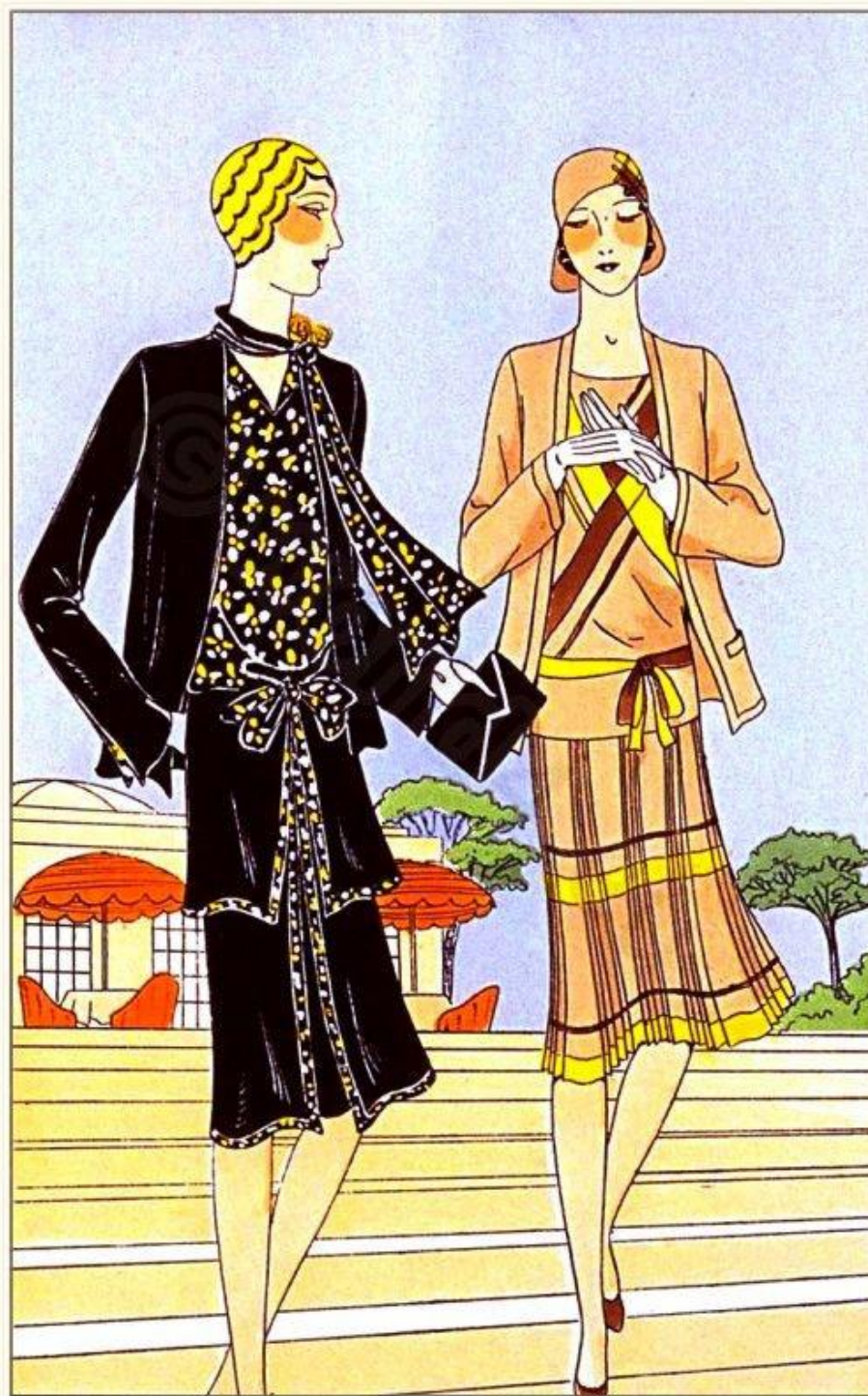
MARCH TOUR

How I Refuel My Model A

I will start with some information about gasoline. It is highly volatility which means it can vaporize easily. It is a class 1 flammable liquid which means it has a flash point below 100 degrees Fahrenheit. The gasoline vapors can ignite fast causing an explosion; therefore, the Federal Government has initiated the retail gasoline dispensing safety act. This act sets forth the rules for refueling a vehicle. I will only cover the most important rules. Do not re-enter your vehicle while refueling. Static electricity can be created causing the gasoline to ignite. It also states that metal objects can't be inserted next to the fuel nozzle. Metal on metal can conduct electricity or cause a spark igniting the gasoline. Now, you probably won't get caught using metal, but the down side is that if you cause the explosion you are held liable for the damages. Harley Davidson motorcycle dealers sell a nozzle boot fork that holds the vapor recovery boot away from the nozzle. It is made of nylon which is non-conductive and safe to use. Also, to note, is that gas cans must be filled on the ground so they are properly grounded.



When I refuel my A's I use a drip bib (photo 1) which my wife made using a scrap piece of Naugahyde upholstery and left over fender welting. Next I insert my gas tank extension (photo 2) into the Model A fuel tank.



My extension is made of PVC schedule 40 pipe. It does not conduct electricity and it is light weight so if it is dropped onto the fender no damage is done. Metal gas tank extensions can be used on the fuel tank because the vehicle is grounded. The PVC fitting is a one piece adaptor of 1 1/2 inch pipe to threads. I also added an O ring for a tighter fit. The O ring is 3/16 inch thick x 1 1/2 inch inside diameter. It is a tight fit on 28-29 Model A's and can be threaded into the 30-31 Model A's. The cost is about \$5 with the pieces available at most hardware and plumbing suppliers. This works good to hold the vapor recovery boot in place, and fill the tank full. I have been using this set up since 2004 with no problems!

If you run across issues during your periodic maintenance that you are unsure of, contact one of the SWAT Team Members: (Special Work and Tools). They will help you take the next step.

Now that we are hopefully getting some good weather, it is time to think about taking your Model A on a tour. There are some important guidelines that each Member needs to review before joining a tour. In the Beaver Chapter Membership Roster 2017 on pages 40 & 41 are the **Touring Rules**. It makes the tours safer and more enjoyable if we follow these guidelines.

The March tour to Jack Lorangers' hot glass studio was a great success as reported by Gene Scott the winner of the raffle. I have heard many good reports about this tour and we owe Andrew Jackman a big Thank You for leading it.

The Portland Swap Meet is April 7, 8, 9, and the duty rosters have been filled out. Be sure to get to the Duty Office early so that you will be at your station in time. Remember the penalties for the club are serious for any of our stations that are not manned. We cannot afford "no shows"!!!!

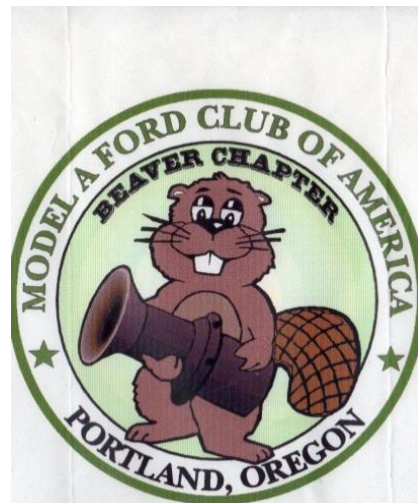
TINY TIP: Question - Timing: I cannot detect a detent in my timing gear with my timing pin. A recent overhaul which replaced the timing gears must have overlooked this provision. Anyway it seems I will have to locate the TDC of cylinder #1 manually through the spark plug hole. my question... which cylinder is cylinder #1? I cannot find any reference to cylinder designation in any of my literature. is #1 next to the fan or next to the firewall? thanks for clarifying.

Answer: #1 cylinder is the front cylinder behind the fan. The detent in some of the timing gears is not very pronounced. With #1 piston at the very top of the cylinder, insert the pin in the timing gear cover and then use the fan blade to move the crank back and forth (may need to tighten the fan belt) to locate the detent. It sometimes helps to grind a sharper tip on the pin to help locate the detent. Hopefully your timing gear was installed in the correct position with the crank gear.

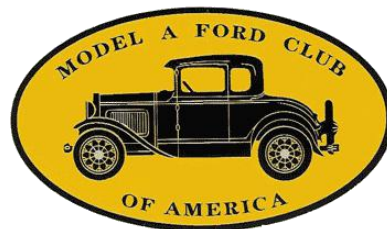
