

PAINTING WHEELS

If you are painting your wheels and don't want to remove and reinstall the tires, here's a tip for masking the tires.


- · deflate the tube
- · break the tire beads from the wheels
- cut a "donut" from a sheet of heavy-duty plastic. The center of the donut is an 18" diameter circle and the outside of the donut is 32" (for 19" wheels). For 21" wheels, add 2 inches to these dimensions.
- Stretch the donut over the wheel allowing the plastic to drop down into the drop center of the wheel. The donut will cover the tire and can be taped in place with masking tape.
- Now, do the same thing with another plastic donut on the other side of the wheel.

ONE CAUTION: don't use the plastic donuts for priming and then forcolorcoat painting (paint peels easily from the plastic and flaked paint will mess up your job). Make donuts for each paint procedure.

PREVENTING PAINT POPPING

If you have trouble with freshly painted wheels "popping the paint" when the lug nuts are tightened, "mask" the holes in the wheels with a set of lug nut spacers held in place with small strips of body caulking material. After the paint job, these spacers can be carefully removed. A light coating of lubricant on the tapered part of the lug nut will help prevent "popping the paint."

Tiny Tip

The starter motor and generator when removed from the Model A are hard to store. The round shape cannot be stacked. There are projections from the ends so you cannot set them on end. Storage gets to be a problem, but is easily solved.

Just take two pieces of plywood $4'' \times 5 \frac{1}{2}''$. Cut a half circle (radius $2 \frac{1}{4}''$) in the plywood and nail this to a 2×6 that is cut 4'' long. You can line the

half circle with felt or a scrap piece of radiator shell lacing. This is a nifty solution and cost almost nothing.

2022 Portland Swap Meet - The Inside Scoop

I have received many questions about this year's swap meet. The most common is "will there be a swap meet this year?" I would like to respond "absolutely!" The truth is less certain, so my answer generally lists several reasons why we think that there will be a 2022 Portland Swap Meet. The distilled answer is that there will be a swap meet unless the government prevents it.

On a more positive side – our goal is in sight, and we are progressing well. The official planning cycle started in September. Central to the planning process is the Swap Meet Committee which is nominally about a hundred people with its membership drawn from the six sponsoring car clubs. These are the folks who arrange for: the building, the buses, rent fences, contract for pot-a-pots, print the program, obtain traffic plan approval, provide security, mail vendor packets, provide duty packets – and the list goes on. Basically, they do all the things that allow us to open the gates to vendors and customers.

Most of us think that the swap meet starts on Thursday with vendor move-in. The swap meet committee actually starts its move-in on Tuesday. It is a big job to complete the layout of vendor stalls in each of the buildings, and the outside lot. Without this dedicated group, vendors would not know where to build their stalls, and the Thursday move-in would not turn out well. Many vendors know the process, what gate to enter, where to go, and what needs to get done – and many do not. That is where the club duty volunteers come in. We are there to provide direction, answer questions, and keep the process moving forward. Not glamours, but absolutely required – and amazing to watch.

I will have the 2022 Swap Meet duty signup sheets at the February meeting. Our roster is about half filled and I know that you do not want to miss out on this year's event, so give me a call at 503.788.596, or send an e-mail to mike_worthing@comcast.net, and we will find a place for you.

Tiny Tip

I like to play a little mental numbers game featuring the Model A. I try to count all the nuts and bolts that one has to remove when taking the engine out of a Model A. I think my highest total was 47...

Many of you know I had to remove the engine from our Sport Coupe, Tilly, because the car would not start. The problem was a loose timing gear which has been replaced with a nice aluminum one. With the engine back in place I ended up with a tremendous oil leak out of the rear main. On a dry day you can track our car by the oil drips. This problem must be addressed. My hunch is the new nitrile seal at the rear main must not be in place properly or it is damaged.

It's not a fun thing to look forward to but the engine must be removed. The last time this happened, June of 2021, I spend a lot of time needlessly looking for the parts that I just removed a day or two before. This time I decided I must get organized. Remembering the little mental counting exercise I like to play, I listed all the parts in the order they are to be removed. To help keep track of bits and pieces I also noted the number of nuts or bolts involved. Knowing my list was going to be used on reassembly, I also listed the foot pounds of torque where this is important.

My little mental game with a high count of 47 was way off! I missed many things that you have to remove. My list on paper is fairly complete and I came up with 192 nuts and bolts. This just shows how poor my memory is. You should try this some time when you are bored stiff. Mentally take out an engine and count the little nuts, bolts and special washers. Lastly, if anyone wants a copy of my parts list let me know. \sim David Adair
